




OKI, WELCOME to SIKSIKAITSITAPI TERRITORY

CHIEF ROY FOX

Makiinima, Chief Roy Fox has been involved in political & business leadership for the Kainai / Blood Tribe and others for over 50 years. Makiinima was 24 years old when he was first elected to the Blood Tribe Council & he was mentored by wise & knowledgeable leaders such as **Chief Shot Both Sides & long-time Council** members & other leaders in the business sector within the Tribe & it's various partners. He was elected as Chief of the Blood Tribe in 1980 upon the retirement & support of Chief Shot Both Sides. He was elected continuosly until his initial retirement in 1996 after serving 8 terms as the Kainai Chief and proceeded to work in the resource sector privately and for the national Indian Resource Council as the President/CEO. He continued to work in the resource industry after he led the IRC for about 15 years & was eventually convinced to run for political office again.

He was elected with a great majority in 2016 & has served the Kainai/Blood Tribe as the Chief since then.

His political & business accomplishments are too numerous to mention in this brief summation however that information can be provided.

Special Dedication to **Iitoomitaipiima**, **ANGIE** (**Louise Marie**) **CROP EARED WOLF**





Iitoomitaipiima (First to Enter) Angie (Louise Marie) CROP EARED WOLF, was born on July 21, 1958 to Joe and Louise Crop Eared Wolf. She was named after her Great Grandmother, Iitoomitaipiima, Tall Man's mother. She belonged to the Fish Eater and Lone Fighter Clans.

Angie grew up with her parents, her sisters and brothers on the family ranch. She attended St. Mary's Residential School. She graduated from F. P. Walsh in Fort Macleod and the University of Lethbridge with a BA in Native Studies. She also attended the University of Regina and Lethbridge Community College.

Angie's life work centered around the preservation of the Kainai Oral Tradition, including research, interviewing our elders, as well as transcribing and translating the interviews from Blackfoot to English. Her latest project was working with Blood Tribe Management collecting Kainai stories from the Elders and along with her team producing a series of videos intended for community education and the preservation of our old-time stories for future generations.

Angie was a kind and gentle soul, always ready to help and support you in your time of need; always going out of her way out to make things right. As a young girl she had a special love for cats, was always bringing strays home and nurturing them back to health.

Angie loved the outdoors, and was an avid gardener, she a had way with plants and flowers as well she had a special talent for cooking and baking.

Angie was a great writer and was well read and interested in many topics including history, culture, politics and First Nation issues and was a great proponent of Blackfoot language preservation. Angie will be remembered for her genuine interest in and deep commitment to the preservation of our Blackfoot language and culture.

Sii pii nama yaaki Adelaide (Dolly) Creighton

Siipiinamayaaki is a member of the Blood Tribe – Kainai People in Southern Alberta of the Blackfoot Confederacy. She is a mother of one son and two daughters. A grandmother of seven and has eight great grandchildren.

Dolly received her former education in her community on the Blood Reserve in a residential school for ten years. Her life experiences including her academic education; trainings; teachings and professional careers in Nursing; Social Work: Mental Health Therapist; Community Health Educator; Community Development Coordinator; Project/Program Planner; Certified Trainer; Holistic Healing & Energy Medicine Facilitator. These experiences have provided her with the knowledge and skills to help others how to help themselves.

Her personal healing journey took her to many places across Canada and in the world including California, Europe and Australia. Dolly has experienced the wisdom of body-mind communication and its healing powers including her advanced training in "Intuition & Clairvoyance" teachings. Her journey of learning is on-going from the wisdom of First Nations Knowledge Keepers; Healers; Herbalists; Hypno-Therapists including world renowned & distinguished teachers from the "Harmony Institute Of PsychoSomatic Therapy" in Australia. She uses and includes these concepts and techniques to help others how to help themselves, whether it be personal, family, groups, management, professional or community sessions. Her First Nations Blackfoot Culture and Language is a crucial integrated part of transferring her knowledge and information.

Dolly's passion is to create awareness and promote the importance of healing from our past. Especially as it relates to the impacts and effects of the legacy of colonization and residential schools. She believes that in order to become whole and healthy one must balance the body, mind and spirit — and have a strong spiritual connection. "When we are balanced we are living fully. When we are not at ease with body, mind and spirit, the result is disease, illness and discord. We tend to get wholistic diseases and for that reason we need wholistic medicine. No body, healer or anyone can give us this balance unless we choose to participate in our own healing process". Dolly believes that healing is a very personal choice. It is something that doesn't come from outside of us — it begins within (inside) each and everyone of us as human beings
